ORDER OF THE ARROW



SECTION SE-1

Section SE-1 consists of the twelve Order of the Arrow Lodges located in Virginia, Delawere, Maryland and Washington, D. C.. The creation of SE-1 began in 1972, when the Boy Scouts of America decided to realign itself into six functioning regions instead of the twelve that had been used for several years. The purpose of the sections organization is to act as an effective unifying force between the lodges and to provide training and resources to help each individual lodge function better.

The "roots" of SE-1 can be traced back to the old Area III-A. Until 1952, due to the large growth in the number of lodges in the region, travel distances and size of the region; the area decided to divide into six areas. The southern lodges were formed into Area III-C. The charter lodges were:

Nawakwa No. 3 Nentico No. 12 Koo Koo Ku Hoo No. 161 Shenandoah No. 258 Shenshawpotoo No. 276 Blue Heron No. 349
Powhatan No. 456
Kecoughtan No. 463
Amangamek Winit No. 470
Chanco No. 483

The first Area function was hosted by Blue Heron Lodge and held at Camp Darden in 1953. In 1954, Nentico Lodge No. 12 was realigned with Area III-A, and mine lodges remained. These lodges through their Pow-Vows and famous Kitchen Kabinets forged Area III-C into a strong area. The nine lodges continued together until the region realignment and formed a strong core from which SE-1 was fromed. Powhatan Lodge and Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge merged to form Tutelo Lodge No. 161 in 1973. That same year, Nentico, Nentego, Guneukitchik, and Ahtuhquog joined with the southern lodges of old Area III-C to form SE-1. These four stong new lodges had previously been in Areas III-A, III-E, and III-F. Their varied background and traditions combined with the history and philosophy of Area III-C created a strong basis for the frindships and fellowships of SE-1 to develop. Out of the four old areas came a new stronger unique Section that has an identity of its own. SE-1

has had a bright history; but the future is brighter still...

NAWAKWA LODGE - NO. 3 - Robert E. Lee Council - Richmond, Virginia

Nawakwa Lodge was originally named Pamunkey Lodge No. 3, which was granted a charter on November 25, 1919. The lodge bore the name of the Pamunkey tribe that inhabited the eastern regions of Virginia and were a part of the powerful Powhatan Confederacy. Using the eagle as its totem the Pamunkey Lodge continued intermittently intil 1945.

In 1945, the lodge was reorganized and rechartered as Nawakwa Lodge
No. 3. The racoon was the totem chosen by the membership and appears on
early issues of the lodge. The name Nawakwa is from the tongue of the
Chiopewa tribe. When translated it means, "in the middle of the forest",
simlar to the forester who finds the best timber in the certer of the forest.

The lodge totem was changed to the cardinal in 1957, and is still in use today and appears on many lodge neckerchiefs and emblems.

In the early years Nawakwa Lodge preformed service projects at the council camps Shawondasse and Wakoda. In recent history the lodge has provided much service to Camp Brady Saunders, which serves as its home, and Buggs Islard. In addition to service, the lodge donated twenty acres of land adjacent to Camp Brady Saunders to provide additional camping areas.

The lodge's first newsletter, Tom-Tom, was first issued on November 30, 1951.

The "Tom-Tom" is still issued on a regular basis to all members and has won several area awards since its early start.

In 1951, Nawakwa Lodge bestowed its first Vigil Horors on Colonel Joseph Koch and Jim Barber. Both of these arrowmen contributed greatly to Scouting in and around the Richmond area and the development of Nawakwa Lodge.

During Nawakwa's 50th Anniversary year, 1969, they hosted the largest gathering of arrowmen in the history of Area III-C, at the area Pow-Wow. Approximately 1200 Arrowmen attended the hugh affair held at the Virginia State Fairgrounds in Richmond.

NENTICO LODGE - No. 12 - Baltimore Area Council - Baltimore, Maryland

Nentico Lodge was first granted a charter or May 17, 1922. Camp

Linstead in Severna Park, Maryland was the site of Nentico's first organized

meeting. E. Urner Goodman (Eluwak Kittakima), founder of the Order of the

Arrow, conducted the installation of Nentico Lodge.

Nentico, pronounced Nantico, derives its name from a tribe of the Delawares. The Nanticohes broke off from the main body of the Delawares in Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey. This group migrated south into Maryland and part of Virginia to establish their own territory and villages. Camp Linstead, the lodge's first home was located in the area once inhabited by the Nanticohes and the members chose to follow the area history. The lodges totem is the bald eagle.

One of the highlights to Nentico's early history was the hosting of the Grand Lodge Meeting held October 12-13, 1923 at Camp Linstead. The Grand Lodge Meetings were a forerunner of the National Order of the Arrow Conferences held today.

After the closing of Camp Linstead, Nentico Lodge provided many service hours at the council's camps Rock Hall and Cone. Broad Creek Memorial Scout Camp has served as the home of Nentico Lodge since 1948. The Mystic Circle of Nentico Lodge was established at Camp Broad Creek in 1949 and still remains there today.

Nentico Lodge hosted its first area conference in 1950 while a member of Area III-A. It became one of the ten original lodges chartered in old Area III-C in 1953. The lodge returned to Area III-A in 1954 and remained in that area until the creation of Section SE-1 in 1973.

NENTEGO LODGE - NO. 20 - Del-Mar-Va Council - Wilmington, Delaware

On July 29, 1925, a charter was granted to Unalachico Lodge of the Del-Mar-Va Council. The totem of Unalachico Lodge was the turkey. By the late twenties, the lodge became inactive and was disbanded.

Through the efforts of Delmont Lodge No. 43 of the Valley Forge Council, Lodge No. 20 was reorganized on June 22, 1957. The name chosen by the membership was the Delaware term, Nentego, which was one of the major Delaware tribes and means "people from across the water". Delmont lodge inducted two boys from each district and from the council professional staff to provide the initial core of the Nentego Lodge. The lodge totem chosen was the rock fish that are found in the waters of the Chesapeake Bay. The lodge also selected lodge colors to represent the area; Blue for the Chesapeake Bay waters and Grey for the plentiful rock fish in the area waters.

Rodney Scout Reservation serves as the site of Sampson Lodge the head-wuarters of Nentego Lodge. The building was given to the lodge in 1967 by the council camping committee in a dilapidated state. Since that time and many service hours later, the building has been completely rebuilt and remodeled to provide the lodge an attractive meeting place. Also, during the same time period, the original Lodge Ceremonial site was rebuilt in preparation for the 1970 Area III-A Conference hosted by Nentego.

Lodge service projects also include the New Castle Historical Trail and the Caesar Rodney Trail. These trails are open to all scouts and scouting groups.

Nentego Lodge hosted the 1962 Area III-A Conference and the 1970 Area III-A Conference. On January 1, 1973, Nentego Lodge became a member of the newly formed section SE-1.

TUTELO LODGE - NO. 161 - - Blue Ridge Mountains Council - Vinton, Virginia

Tutelo Lodge came into being in January, 1973 with the merger of Powhatan Lodge No. 456 and Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge No. 161. Both Powhatan and Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodges had been original charter lodges in old Area III-C. The lodge retained the older number 161 and chose the new name of Tutelo Lodge. The Tutelo tribe was the last Indian tribe to inhabit the area when Camp Powhatan is now located. The Tutelos were a branch of Souian Indians, who eventually became extinct after being forced from their tribal grounds by the advancing white settlers.

Three arrows became the new lodge totem as the merger occurred. An owl with outspread wings had been the totem of Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge and Indian in a war bonnet had been the totem of Powhatan Lodge. These totems were later honored in a service, flap issued in 1978. The original honor flap of Tutelo Lodge had an old stone iron ore furance highlighted on it. The furnace which sits on private property near the entrance to Camp Powhatan has in many cases, been mistaken as the lodge totem. The three arrows had been the tribal totem of the Tutelo tribe.

Tutelo can trace its roots back to the formation of Ne-Pah-Win in the old Piedmont Council. Ne-Pah-Win Lodge was granted a charter on July 7, 1939. Ne-Pah-Win meant "sleeping Indian", which caused some dissatsifaction amoung the members. This dissatisfaction led to the changing of the name in 1953, to the name Koo Koo Ku Hoo, "wise old bird of the forest". Camp Monocan served as the home of Koo Koo Ku Hoo and Camp Powhatan served as the home of the Powhatan Lodge. The name Powhatan was chosen to represent the camp which was named after Chief Powhatan who led the powerful Powhatan Confederacy of Virginia.

Current lodge functions and service projects are carried out alternately at Camps Powhatan and Ottari. Tutelo Lodge survived both the merging of two lodges and the change over from Area III-C to Section SE-1. Their strength and flexibility is a credit to their membership and a strong link within the section.

SHENANDOAH LODGE - NO. 258 - Stonewall Jackson Area Council - Waynesboro, Virginia

Shenandoah Lodge had its early beginning on February 19, 1944 when Robert E. "Pop" Bruce, a field commissioner received a letter stating the procedures for forming an Order of the Arrow Lodge. A charter was granted to operate a lodge on March 29, 1944. An organizational meeting was held at the Staurton Y.M.C.A. on the night of May 17, 1944. The initial induction team inducted fifteen Scouts and Scouters into the Order of the Arrow. The Ceremonial team was headed by Dr. Berwyn Thomas, and consisted of Dr. Karl E. Shedd, Garland Huddleston, and J. W. Fix.

The lodge name was derived from the council camp, Camp Shenandoah, which was located on the banks of the North Fork of the Shenandoah River. The river flows through the Shenandoah Valley which served as the hunting grounds and war path for the Tuscaroras, Catawbas, Delawares, Iroquios, Shawnees, Cherokees and many other wandering bands. Shenandoah comes from the Indian word, Sherrando, which means "dauthter of the stars". The final burial mounds of the massacred Senedos were located near the site of the Scout camp.

The lodge totem chosen was an arrowhead, with the profile of an Indian chief superimposed on it. The arrowhead is found throughout the Valley of Virginia and at the lodges present home, Camp Shenandoah, near Swoope, Virginia.

In the Fall of 1949, the first Vigil Honor members were selected by the lodge and they went through the ceremonies at the 1950 Area III-A Pow Wow at Camp Broad Creek.

The first lodge newsletter, "Natima Sakita's Fezuta" (big chiefs medicine), was issued in April 1956. The present day newsletter, Shenand ah Smoke Signals, had its firstissue published in January 1962, and is now printed five times a year.

Camp Shenandoah is the scene of many lodge service projects. The latest major lodge service project has been the construction of a new handicraft shelter.

SHENSHAWPOTOO LODGE - NO. 276 - Shenandoah Area Council - Winchester, Virginia

The creation of Shenshawpotoo Lodge began August 17, 1944 when it was issued its first charter. Local Scouters, Basil Starkey (Scout Executive & Pohopoco Lodge), Ray Garrabrandt (Nentico Lodge), and Stanley Curdiff (Kon-Kon-Tu Lodge) formed the original tap out and ceremonial team for the induction of fifteen charter members.

Using the first syllables of the council name and the names of the three districts an composite name was adopted by the membership. As a totem, the lodge selected the deer, because of the great number found in and around the council camp, Camp Rock Enon. Many deer have been seen in the camp and deertracks are always found near every watering hole. From these tracks, comes the name of the lodge newsletter, Deertracks, which was first issued in December 1963.

Originally, a member of Area III-A, Shenshawpotoo Lodge first participated in an area conference at Camp Horseshoe near Rising Sun, Maryland, in 1948. Shenshawpotoo became one of the charter members of old Area III-C in 1953 and helped with the transition to section SE-1 in 1973.

During the Area III-A Pow Wow at Camp Trexler in 1949, Ray Garrabrandt was accorded the lodge's first Vigil Honor. Phil Hunter, one of the original charter members, was second Arrowman to receive the honor in 1953, at Camp Darden.

Shenahawpotoc Arrowmen have participated in numerous service projects at Camp Rock Enon. Early projects included the clearing of an area for Miller Lake and helping tear down parts of the old hotel and cabins to prenare camping areas. In 1961, the Gleason Memorial Campfire Circle was constructed, which included wiring and floodlights to be used during the 1962 Area III-C Pow-Wow. The lodge continues service with Ordeal weekends scheduled at the beginning and end of each summer camping season.

GUNEUKITSCHIK LODGE - NO. 317 - Mason-Dixon Council - Hagerstown, Maryland

Camp Hidden Valley located in Cowan's Gap State Park was the scene of Guneukitschik Lodge's first induction during the summer of 1945. The Ordeal Team was provided by a local lodge and the charter was granted August 6, 1945.

The ancient spelling of Conocheague Creek, Guneukitschik, was chosen as the lodge name. Guneukitschik is a Delaware term meaning "indeed a long way". Conocheague flows the entire length of the council. The lodge totem is an arrow with a rattlesnake coiled around it. The rattlesnake is very common to the council area.

Camp Sinoquipe near Ft. Littleton, Pennsylvania has served as the home of Guneukitschik Lodge since 1948. The lodge currently holds two ordeals there every summer and many hours of cheerful service have been provided by Guneukitschik Lodge to Camp Sinoquipe. In 1968, a council ceremonial ring was completed. A new rifle range and visitor's latrine were completed in 1970. The J. Warren Large Nature Lodge was dedicated in 1973, followed by the showers and dressing room in 1974.

In 1957, at the area conference, J. Warren Large was the first Vigil honor member inducted by Guneukitschik Lodge. The lodge started performing its own vigil inductions at Camp Sinoquipe in 1959.

Guneukitschik Lodge hosted the Area 3-E Pow-Wow in 1960 and the Area 3-E Fellowship in 1968. In 1973, Guneukitschik joined the newly organized section SE-1 and hosted the 1976 SE-1 Conclave at Camp Sinoquipe.

BLUE HERON LODGE - NO. 349 - Tidewater Council - Norfolk, Virginia

In the Fall of 1946, forty Scouts and Scouters participated in the Order of the Arrow Ordeals under the leadership and guidance of Octoraro Lodge from Pennsylvania. The founding Ordeal ceremony took place at Darden Scout Reservation, the council camp, which served as the home of Blue Heron Lodge until its closing. The official charter was granted August 19, 1946 and the lodge has grown rapidly since that time.

The lodge names were selected because of the great number of Blue Herons that inhabited Camp Darden. The original totem, often referred to as "baby blue", was the young blue heron, which remains white until the age of three or four. The present totem, a blue heron with a fish in its mouth standing at the edge of the lake, was adopted in 1954.

Blue Heron Lodge was one of the original charter lodges of old Area III-C and hosted the first Area III-C Pow-Wow at Camp Darden. In 1973, Blue Heron joined the area realignment and became a member of Section SE-1.

Pipsico Scout Reservation serves as the home of Blue Heron Lodge and is the site of the Lodge Museum. Pipsico has served as the site of both Area III-C Pow-Wows and SE-1 Conclaves. Numerous service projects have been carried out at the camp including the large OA Shelter constructed at Camp Kiwamis.

In the Fall of 1978, Blue Heron was the host of the SE-1 Indian Seminar and the Regional Lodge Training Conference at Little Creek Amphibious Base.

KECOUGHTAN LODGE - NO. 463 - Peninsula Council - Newport News, Virginia

On June 6, 1951, at Camp Delmont in Pennsylvania, six Scouts and one Scouter began their Ordeals that would eventually grow into Order of the Arrow Lodge No. 463, Kecoughtan Lodge. This group did not complete their Ordeals at Camp Delmont; but returned to Virginia and completed the Ordeals under the supervision and guidance of Blue Heron Lodge at Camp Darden on June 14, 1951. The group returned to their Camp Okee and nine more Scouts and Scouters were selected to go to Camp Darden for their Ordeals. On July 5, 1951 the lodge was granted a charter with twenty members listed on its roster.

The membership shose the name Kecoughtan after the Indian Village located across the York River from Camp Okee. An acorn was chosen as the lodge totem, logically followed by the lodge moto "from the little acorn, the mighty oak tree grows". The acorn symbolizes the growth and maturity of a young man as he travels the paths of scouting.

The original pocket flap design was adopted in 1953 and has remained basically unchanged since that time. It contains the acorns which serve as a background for the W.W.W. and serve as reminders of the three points of the Scout Oath.

The two Confederate flags represent the Southern heritage and traditions of the area and the gallantry and bravery of the men who fought in the area. The silver letters stand for the brightness of an Arrowmans deeds and the black background symbolizes the secrecy of traditions of the order.

In 1958, Charlie White became Kecoughtan's first Vigil Honor member at the Area III-C Pow-Wow held at Camp Shenandoah, under the direction of Nawakwa Lodge.

"Kecoughtan Kryer", the lodge newsletter, was first issued in 1962 and won the newsletter competition in 1971.

The lodge was a charter member of old AREA III-C and has hosted several events both in AREA III-C and Section SE-1. Camp Chickahominy serves as the home of the ledge and many hours of service by Arrowmen go into its operation.

AMANGAMEK-WIPIT LODGE - NO. 470 - National Capitol Area Council - Washington, D.C.

Originally named Amanquemack Lodge, Amangamek-Wipit Lodge was founded in the Fall of 1952. The lodge was granted a charter on March 12, 1952 after the co-founders, Ralph Lutz and John Obermeyer, visited the various troops in the council area to conduct elections. Three seperate Ordeals were held by Nentico, Blue Heron and Nawakwa lodges to induct the new members into Amanquemack Lodge. In the Spring of 1953, the lodge was able to conduct its own Ordeal ceremonies. The lodge name was changed to Amangamek-Wipit Lodge in 1954. It corrected an earlier error in spelling and it is translated to mean "large fish tooth". The shark's tooth was the totem chosen, because of the large numbers of shark teeth found along the Chesapeake shores of Camp Roosevelt, which served as the early home for the lodge.

In the Spring of 1954, Nentico Lodge provided the first Brotherhood ceremony for the lodge at Broad Creek Scout Camp, and the lodge provided its own brotherhood ceremonies the following year. Also, the lodges first Vigils were inducted at the 1954 Area III-C Pow Wow held at Camp Rock Enon.

The lodge is one of the original charter members of old Area III-C and hosted the 1956 Area III-C Pow Wow at Camp Roosevelt. In 1973, the lodge followed the area realignment and became an active member of Section SE-1.

Cheerful service projects have been provided for Camps Roosevelt, Wilson, Tapawingo, Chesapeake, Backer and Goshen Scout Camps. Recently the lodge provided service projects for Camp Happyland, which served as the site of the 1980 SE-1 Conclave.

The lodge serves the area in and around Washington, D.C.. This heritage is reflected by the use of the Capitol Building on some issues of pocket flaps and the use of the Washington Monument with the sharks tooth on other emblems.

CHANCO LODGE - NO. 483 - Old Dominion Area Council - Suffolk, Virginia

On September 25, 1952, Chanco Lodge was awarded a charter to operate.

The lodge chose two totems to represent the lodge and its membership. First, the membership chose the brave Indian Chanco who saved the colonists at Jamestwon from extinction during the bloody massacre of 1622. In the Spring of 1622, the powerful Powhatan Confederacy decided to eliminate the presence of the white colonists from the state of Virginia in a series of secret attacks. Chanco, a converted Powhatan Indian brawe, found out about the attack in time to paddle a cance across the James River and warn the settlers at Jamestown. The spot where Chanco crossed the James is located near the old council scout camp site near Scotland Wharf. Thanks to Chanco's timely warning in the middle of the night the settlement was saved.

The second totem chosen, was that of deer. The deer is the largest and most plentiful animal found in the counties served by the Old Dominion Area Council. The choice of the buck symbolizes the nobility of the deer in its enviornment; its alertness, swiftness, and knowledge of the forest. These are all characteristics each scout strives to obtain and maintain.

Chanco Lodge was chartered briefly before the creation of Area III-C, and became one of its original members and later made the smooth transition in the formation of Section SE-1. Chanco hosted the Area III-C Pow-Wow in 1970 at Camp Siouan and hosted the 1974 SE-1 Conclave at the same site.

AHTUHQUOG LODGE - NO. 540 - Potomac Council - Cumberland, Maryland

Ahtuhquog Lodge was granted a charter to operate on August 26, 1959.

The year before, in 1958, the Potomac Council sent a delegation of Scouts and Scouters to an OA Training Conference in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania to gain some knowledge of the Order of the Arrow functions and organization. In August of 1958, Willis V. Smith (Pomomac Scout Executive), along with mineteen other Scouts and Scouters took their Ordeals at Camp Potomac under the guidance of Chimalus Lodge. Ahtuhquog Lodge was in operational exsistance for approximately one year before obtaining a charter.

The members chose the name Ahtuhquog which means "deer in high places".

The white-tailed deer is native to the council area which includes a stretch of the Allegheny Mountains that runs across the eastern panhandle of Vest Virginia and Western Maryland.


Willis V. Smith was the first Ahtuhquog Arrowman to receive the Vigil Honor in September 1961.

Originally assigned to old Area 3-F, delegations from Ahtuhquog have attended every area and section function since 1962. In 1973, the lodge joined with its neighboring lodges to the South to form Section SE-1.

While a member of old Area 3-F, Ahtuhquog was known for its Dance Teams. In Area competition, the team placed second in 1964 and 1968 and took first place in 1965, 1966, 1967, 1969, 1970 and 1971. On the National Level, Jon Fielder won the Fancy Dance Competition at the National Order of the Arrow Conference in 1969 and 1971.

Camp Potomac serves as the home of Ahtuhquog Lodge and is the site of numerous lodge projects and work weekends. The lodge encourages cheerful service through its 150 hour Service Award Program which it instituted in 1970.
